<u>Lawyering Skills</u>. After two years of teaching the standard "Lawyering Skills" course, which includes interviewing skills, legal research and writing, counseling, fact investigation, depositions, motion practice, and trial advocacy, I created the Public Interest version of the course for the program in Public Interest Law and Policy. The "Lawyering Skills for Public Interest Program Students" course emphasizes the special skills and issues that public interest lawyers are more likely to employ and encounter in practice. The fall semester focuses on housing-related problems (discrimination and landlord-tenant relations) while the spring semester addresses domestic violence and child abuse.

<u>Co-Teaching</u>. I also have co-taught the following courses: Local Economic Development; Community Outreach, Education and Organizing; Public Policy Advocacy; Depositions and Discovery; Simulated Trial Advocacy (four semesters); and Live Client Trial Advocacy, supervising students in administrative hearings and Superior Court (three semesters), including asylum issues in immigration court.
