NOTES ON 2009/2010 SCHOOL OF LAW CALENDAR AND REGISTRATION FOR CLASSES

NOTICE: UPPER-DIVISION WRITING REQUIREMENT

The faculty has enacted an upper-division writing requirement as mandated for all law schools by the ABA. Courses that provide an opportunity to fulfill the writing requirement are identified in the schedule. NOTICE: PRIORITY ENROLLMENT FOR STRAUS DISPUTE RESOLUTION ELECTIVES

JD students participating in either the dispute resolution certificate or master's program will receive priority enrollment in all dispute resolution elective courses, with the exception of the Alternative Dispute Resolution course. JD students not participating in either program may place themselves on a waitlist and seat availability will be determined at the beginning of the semester. Seats not filled by program participants will be released to JD students on the waitlist.

NOTICE: RESCHEDULING EXAMS

Every effort has been made to avoid conflicts between required courses and in the final exam schedules. Students may only petition to reschedule a final exam if two final exams are to be taken on the same day. Therefore, it is important for you to pay attention to the final exam schedule when you are selecting your courses. Petitions to change one of two exams scheduled for the same day must be filed by the seventh week of classes. NOTICE: NEW CERTIFICATE IN CRIMINAL LEGAL PRACTICE

Effective with the Fall 2009 semester the School will offer a Certificate in Criminal Legal Practice. For students contemplating positions in the criminal justice field this program will ensure that you receive the training and substantive knowledge necessary to equip you to pursue this legal specialty. Furthermore, completion of this certificate program will offer tangible evidence to prospective employers that you have the skills and knowledge essential to a career in the field. More information as to the requirements for this program will be available on the School's website.

Third year students are invited and encouraged to participate. Many of you have already completed a number of courses that may be applied toward the certificate. Unfortunately some who are interested simply will not have sufficient time to complete the necessary courses. In order to earn the Certificate, students must apply, preferably in the start of their second year in law school, and must be in good standing in the law school. Each candidate for the Certificate must complete Criminal Procedure, Ethical Criminal Practice (satisfies Professional Responsibility requirement), Trial Practice, a Clinical Criminal Law fieldwork externship with a government agency and the Criminal Law Seminar (needed for the required externship). In addition, the candidate must complete a minimum of eight units in coursework from the following courses: Advanced Criminal Procedure, Juvenile Law, Sentencing & Corrections, White Collar Crime, Domestic Violence Law, a second Clinical Criminal Law fieldwork externship (a maximum of 3 units may be counted toward the certificate), Honors Appellate Advocacy and Honors Trial Advocacy (a maximum of 2 units from the Advocacy courses may be counted toward the certificate).

D & L STRAUS DISTINGUISHED VISITING PROFESSORS

AKHIL REED AMAR (Advanced Constitutional Law: Reading The Constitution): Akhil Reed Amar, Southmayd Professor of Law at Yale Law School, is considered by many to be the most outstanding constitutional law scholar of his generation. He was the second youngest person to be tenured and given a chair in the Yale Law School's history. As an undergraduate he attended Yale College, where he majored in history and economics, won many prizes, earned a perfect grade point average, and was a star debater. Later, as a student at Yale Law School, he served as editor of the *Yale Law Journal*. Professor Amar is the author of several distinguished scholarly books and law review articles, has been cited by the Supreme Court more often than any other scholar under 45, and is one of the most frequently quoted academics in America. He is also a consultant to the popular television show "The West Wing," and serves on the Board of Directors for the National Constitution Center.

DISTINGUISHED VISITING PROFESSORIAL LECTURER

JACK BEARD (National Security Law): Jack Beard is a Professorial Lecturer at the UCLA School of Law where he has taught since 2005 and where the graduating class of 2008 elected him Professor of the Year. Professor Beard received his B.S.F.S, magna cum laude, from Georgetown University, his J.D. magna cum laude, from the University of Michigan, and his LL.M. in International and Comparative Law, from Georgetown Law. From 1990 to 2004, he served as Associate Deputy General Counsel (International Affairs), Office of the Secretary of Defense, and was responsible for legal matters related to international defense cooperation, status of forces issues, nuclear nonproliferation activities, and programs assisting states in the dismantlement of weapons of mass destruction. He served as the senior legal adviser on U.S. Government delegations negotiating numerous international agreements with states in the former Soviet Union and the Middle East. Prior to joining the Office of General Counsel in 1990, he held several positions in government and was also previously engaged in private law practice in Washington, D.C. As an adjunct professor, he received awards for his teaching at both Georgetown Law and the Johns Hopkins School of Advanced International Studies. Professor Beard has written articles on international law and the use of force, the law of war, terrorism, and international efforts to prevent the proliferation of weapons of mass destruction.

DISTINGUISHED VISITING JURIST

ALLEN M. LINDEN (Torts I and Advanced Torts Seminar): Professor Linden currently serves as Supernumerary Judge of the Federal Court of Appeal of Canada and has previously served as Judge of the Supreme Court of Ontario, Judge of the Federal Court of Canada, Appeal Division and Judge of the Court Martial Appeal Court of Canada. Professor Linden received his legal education at Osgoode Hall Law School and University of California, Berkeley (Boalt Hall) where he received the LL.M. and JSD degrees. Professor Linden served as editor-in-chief of the *American Journal of Comparative Law* for more than two decades, has written leading torts treatises and casebooks and has long been considered one of the world's leading comparative torts law scholars. In 2005, Professor Linden received the prestigious John G. Fleming Award in Torts. Professor Linden has taught Advanced Torts at Pepperdine for more than a decade.

NEW FACULTY MEMBER

BABETTE E. BOLIEK (Contracts I and Communications Law Seminar): Professor Boliek earned her B.A. with distinction from California State University, Chico, her J.D. from Columbia University School of Law and her Ph.D. in Economics from the University of California, Davis. While at Columbia, she was both a Harlan Fiske Stone Scholar and a John M. Olin Fellow for Law and Economics. At UC Davis, her areas of specialization included Public Economics, Developmental Economics and Industrial Organization. Her doctoral and subsequent research and writing focuses on the United States telecommunications industry and the consumer welfare effects of regulation within the industry. Professor Boliek clerked for the Honorable Michael B. Mukasey of the United States District Court for the Southern District of New York and is admitted to practice in the State of New York.

Prior to joining the faculty in 2009, Professor Boliek served as a Senior Fellow at the Information Economy Project at George Mason University School of Law, where she integrated her background in law and applied economics to analyze media, Internet, and telecommunications issues. Professor Boliek's work at George Mason followed and echoed her experience as a Fellow for the Center for Communication Law and Policy, a joint research venture of the University of Southern California Gould School Of Law and the Annenberg School for Communication. Prior to her scholarly posts, Professor Boliek practiced corporate law at Friedman Kaplan Seiler & Adelman in New York City. While in private practice, she worked primarily with clients in the media and telecommunications industries and her practice areas included mergers and acquisitions, corporate governance and corporate finance.

NEW ADJUNCT FACULTY MEMBERS

BILL EDDY (Psychology of Conflict): Bill Eddy is President of High Conflict Institute based in Scottsdale, Arizona. Eddy is a Certified Family Law Specialist and a Licensed Clinical Social Worker with experience providing therapy to children, adults, couples, and families in psychiatric hospitals and out patient clinics. He is Senior Family Mediator at the National Conflict Resolution Center in San Diego, California. Eddy has been a speaker in over 20 states, several provinces in Canada, France and Australia, and has become an authority and consultant on the subject of high conflict personalities for family law professionals, employee assistance and human resource professionals, ombudspersons, healthcare administrators, college administrators, homeowners associations, and others.

ERIC HALVORSON (Accounting for Lawyers and Mergers and Acquisitions): Eric Halvorson graduated cum laude from Bob Jones University in 1971 with a B.S. in Accounting. He practiced as a CPA with Arthur Andersen & Co. before attending law school at Duke University, where he graduated in 1976. While attending law school, he served as an editor of the Duke Law Review. Upon graduation, Mr. Halvorson practiced with the Milwaukee law firm of Godfrey & Kahn for 12 years, specializing in corporate, banking and securities law.

Mr. Halvorson was an executive for 14 years with Salem Communications Corporation, a diversified media company, serving in several capacities including General Counsel, Executive Vice President and President/Chief Operating Officer. He directed Salem's initial public debt and equity offerings in 1997 and 1999 and served as a member of its Board of Directors for 20 years. Mr. Halvorson also served as President and Chief Executive Officer of Media Arts Group, a publicly-traded art publishing company. While at Media Arts, he directed the company's going private transaction. Mr. Halvorson has been a member of the Board of Directors of four public companies, and has chaired an Audit Committee and a Nominating/Governance Committee.

From 2000-2003 and 2005-2007, Mr. Halvorson was Executive in Residence at Pepperdine University's Seaver College, where he taught courses in Financial Accounting, Business Law, Management Theory & Practice and Business Ethics. He also served as Adjunct Professor of Law at Pepperdine Law School in 2006-2007, where he taught Accounting for Lawyers and Mergers and Acquisitions.

KENDALL C. REED (Interviewing, Counseling, and Planning): Kendall C. Reed is an attorney, mediator and arbitrator based in Los Angeles, California. His work as a mediator and arbitrator focuses on a wide variety of subject matter areas including intellectual property, business-to-business obligations, internal governance, employment, real estate, and personal injury. His legal practice focuses on business litigation, contracts, entity formations, and trademarks. Mr. Reed attended the University of California San Diego, where he earned a Bachelor of Arts degree in philosophy and psychology, the University of Southern California Law School, where he earned a Juris Doctor degree, and the Pepperdine University School of Law, where he earned a Master of Laws degree.

Mr. Reed's previous experience has included litigation in the insurance defense and insurance coverage arenas, ten years as Associate General Counsel, first for Herbalife International, an international health food and cosmetics company, and then for NMB(USA) Inc., an United States holding company for a Japanese company, ten years as General Counsel for New Hampshire Ball Bearings, Inc., a Los Angeles based aircraft parts manufacturing company, and three years as Director of Intellectual Property for the North American operations of a large Japanese manufacturing company. Mr. Reed is a Fellow of the Chartered Institute of Arbitrators, and is the Chairman of that organization's Southern California Chapter. He is also a Director on the board of the Southern California Mediation Association.

MICHAEL E. ZACHARIA (Cross-Cultural Conflict and Dispute Resolution): Michael Zacharia is Co-Director of the Pacis Project on Faith-Based Diplomacy and an Adjunct Professor of Law at the Straus Institute for Dispute Resolution at Pepperdine University School of Law. He is an Executive Coach and conducts private mediations. He is currently completing his requirements for an LL.M in dispute resolution at the Straus Institute. Michael retired in July, 2007 as Executive Vice President for Business Development, General Counsel and Secretary of DFS Group Limited, the world's largest travel retail company. He joined DFS in Hong Kong in 1996, moved back to San Francisco with the company in 1998, and returned to Hong Kong in 2004 when corporate headquarters were relocated there. Prior to joining DFS in 1996, Michael was a partner for seven years in Wiley, Rein & Fielding, a nationally renowned Washington D.C. law firm, and previously was a litigation partner in the largest law firm in Sacramento, California and a litigation associate with Fulbright and Jaworski.

In 1988, Michael was appointed by President Reagan and confirmed by the Senate as Assistant Secretary of Commerce for Export Administration. Michael has also served as Deputy Assistant Secretary of State for International Trade Controls (1987-88) and Special Counsel to the Under Secretary for International Trade in the Commerce Department (1982-83). In 1981, Michael was selected by a Presidential Commission after a nationwide competitive process as one of 14 White House Fellows and served as Special Assistant in the office of the United States Secretary of State. Michael is a Phi Beta Kappa graduate of the University of California, Berkeley and graduated in the top 4% of his class and Order of the Coif from the University of California, Hastings College of the Law, where he was an editor of the Law Review. After law school, Michael served as a law clerk to Chief Judge Thomas J. MacBride of the United States District Court for the Eastern District of California (1976-78). Michael also externed for Associate Justice William P. Clark, Supreme Court of California (1975).

NEW COURSES BEING OFFERED THIS FALL 2009

ADMIRALTY & MARITIME LAW: This course surveys the substantive and procedural aspects of maritime law in the United States. Topics include maritime jurisdiction, choice of law, carriage of goods by sea, charter parties, tort, collision, maritime liens, and salvage. Additional optional topics may include an introduction to international law of the sea and piracy.

HONORS NEGOTIATION ADVOCACY AND NEGOTIATION COMPETITIONS: Students learn advanced approaches to problem analysis, negotiation strategies, tactics, planning, relationship between negotiators, and other techniques for real world negotiations they will use every day as a lawyer, and for negotiation competitions. Classes will meet Wednesdays, 6 to 10 pm, and at least two Saturday mornings in October or November before the ABA Regional Negotiation competition. Students advancing to the ABA National Final Negotiation competition will meet approximately 7 sessions of four hours, TBA, in January and February 2010. This is a two unit course, plus one unit for competing at the ABA Regional Negotiation competition. Students must have taken or be concurrently enrolled in Negotiation Theory and Practice. INTERNATIONAL CRIMINAL LAW SEMINAR: This seminar is an introduction to international criminal law. The course exposes students to the prosecution, trial, and punishment of individuals alleged to have committed crimes considered to be among the most serious violations of international humanitarian principles. The seminar will address selected issues in international criminal law, including the origins of individual criminal responsibility under international law, the development of international tribunals, and the creation of the International Criminal Court. The objective and subjective components of international crimes, such as genocide, human trafficking, crimes against humanity, war crimes, aggression, and transnational crimes, will be discussed. The course will also cover the general principles of international criminal law, such as the principle of legality, defenses, procedure, and jurisdiction.

INTERNATIONAL CRIMINAL LAW AND HUMAN RIGHTS PRACTICUM: This practicum is limited to five (5) students and it must be taken in conjunction with the "International Criminal Law Seminar." Under the supervision of the professor, students will work on one or more projects dealing with current international criminal law and human rights issues. Projects may include research papers, creating legal writing and analysis teaching materials to be used in other countries, and preparing drafts of court documents, manuals and other legal materials to aid such organizations as the International Justice Mission and other human rights organizations.

NATIONAL SECURITY LAW: This course examines international and U.S. law relevant to the handling of national security matters. On the domestic level, we will study the allocation of power under the Constitution between Congress and the President with respect to war powers and we will assess the role of the courts as a check on the political branches in this area, particularly as it relates to ongoing efforts to fight terrorism. Key legal issues related to the detention and trial of suspected terrorists, including recourse to U.S. courts and the use of military commissions, will be examined. On the international level, the course focuses on international law governing the use of force and conflict management, including an introduction to the problem of war crimes and a review of the U.N. Charter framework for collective efforts to maintain international peace and security. The course concludes by examining selected disarmament and arms control problems, particularly those presented by the proliferation of nuclear weapons.
