NOTICE: PRIORITY ENROLLMENT FOR STRAUS DISPUTE RESOLUTION ELECTIVES

D & L STRAUS DISTINGUISHED VISITING PROFESSOR

AKHIL REED AMAR (Advanced Constitutional Law: Reading The Constitution): Akhil Reed Amar, Sterling Professor of Law and Political Science at Yale Law School, is considered by many to be the most outstanding constitutional law scholar of his generation. He was the second youngest person to be tenured and given a chair in the Yale Law School's history. As an undergraduate he attended Yale College, where he majored in history and economics, won many prizes, earned a perfect grade point average, and was a star debater. Later, as a student at Yale Law School, he served as editor of the *Yale Law Journal*. Professor Amar is the author of several distinguished scholarly books and law review articles, has been cited by the Supreme Court often and is one of the most frequently quoted academics in America. He was also a consultant to the popular television show "The West Wing," and serves on the Board of Directors for the National Constitution Center.

NEW FACULTY MEMBERS

KHRISTA MCCARDEN (Federal Income Tax (Fall), Federal Income Taxation of Business Entities (Spring) and International Tax (Spring)): Before joining Pepperdine, Professor McCarden practiced with Morgan Lewis in London where she focused on all aspects of international taxation, including corporate, individual, estate, and trust planning for U.S. persons conducting business or residing abroad. She also advised individuals and charities on U.S. and cross-border charitable giving and structuring and served as Pro Bono Vice Chair for the office. Professor McCarden has published articles in the United States and in the United Kingdom and regularly presented lectures on US/UK dual-qualified charitable structures. While living in London, Professor McCarden was actively involved with her local church and with several charitable organizations. In addition, she was appointed to the Board of the Harvard Law School Alumni Association of the UK.

Professor McCarden began her legal career with Latham & Watkins LLP in Los Angeles. During her first two years of practice, she was selected as a Washington, D.C. delegate by the State Bar of California and the Los Angeles County Bar Association Taxation sections to present a policy paper on charitable giving and planning before the Internal Revenue Service and the Treasury Department, which was later published. She has practiced international tax law in Paris and completed a clerkship in New York with Judge Barrington D. Parker of the U.S. Court of Appeals for the Second Circuit. Professor McCarden has published articles in the United States and in the United Kingdom and regularly presented lectures on US/UK dual-qualified structures.

DEREK MULLER (Civil Procedure I (Fall), Civil Procedure II (Spring), and Complex Litigation (Spring)): Professor Muller focuses his research on procedure, election law and constitutional law issues. He teaches Civil Procedure and Complex Civil Litigation. Professor Muller is a graduate of Notre Dame Law School, where he was notes editor of the *Notre Dame Law Review*. Following his graduation, he served as a law clerk to Judge Raymond W. Gruender of the U.S. Court of Appeals for the Eighth Circuit. He then worked as a litigation associate in the Chicago, Illinois office of Kirkland & Ellis LLP, where he focused his practice on commercial and appellate litigation. Professor Muller is a member of the Illinois state bar and is admitted to practice in the U.S. Court of Appeals for the Seventh and Eighth Circuits as well as the U.S. District Court for the Northern District of Illinois.

DISTINGUISHED VISITING PRACTITIONER IN RESIDENCE

CHARLES ESKRIDGE (Constitutional Law Seminar: Origins of the Federal Constitution): Charles Eskridge is the Distinguished Visiting Practitioner of Law for Fall 2011. He graduated *summa cum laude* from the Law School in 1990, and now serves on its Board of Visitors. Upon graduation, he served as a law clerk to Byron R. White, Associate Justice of the U.S. Supreme Court; Charles Clark, Chief Judge of the U.S. Court of Appeals for the Fifth Circuit; and Howard M. Holtzmann, U.S. Arbitrator of the Iran-U.S. Claims Tribunal in The Hague. Eskridge has been a partner with the commercial litigation law firm of Susman Godfrey L.L.P. since 1996, where he has focused his practice on complex, high-stakes litigation in federal and state courts across the country. He also serves as an Adjunct Professor of Law at the University of Houston Law Center, where he has taught courses on Federal Courts and Origins of the Federal Constitution.

BIOETHICIST IN RESIDENCE

DR. TANVIR HUSSAIN (Bioethics Seminar): Dr. Hussain is a practicing cardiologist and volunteers as an attending staff at the Los Angeles County-USC Medical Center. After graduating from Rhodes College with bachelor's degrees in biology and philosophy, he returned home to attend medical school at the University of Arkansas for Medical Sciences. As a medical student, he conducted research at The Hastings Center for Bioethics and co-chaired the national student section of the American Society for Bioethics and Humanities. Dr. Hussain completed his residency in internal medicine at the University of Southern California, after which he was a fellow in cardiovascular epidemiology & prevention under a joint program of the Veterans' Administration and Brigham & Women's Hospitals and the Harvard Medical School. While there, he taught at the Harvard Medical School and completed the Program for Clinical Effectiveness at the Harvard School of Public Health. He returned to the University of Southern California and graduated from the cardiovascular medicine fellowship in 2010.

NEW ADJUNCT FACULTY MEMBERS

RABBI YITZCHOK ADLERSTEIN (Jewish Law): Rabbi Adlerstein is the Glazer Institute Visiting Faculty Scholar for the 2011-2012 academic year. He graduated *summa cum laude* from Queens College, and was awarded *Yadin Yadin* (advanced) ordination by the Rabbinical Seminary of America. At Loyola Law School, Rabbi Adlerstein holds the Sydney M. Irmas Adjunct Chair in Jewish Law and Ethics, and teaches Introduction to Jewish Law and Contemporary Issues in Jewish Law. He is the Director of Interfaith Affairs for the Simon Wiesenthal Center, an international human rights organization and NGO. He serves as a *dayan* (judge) on the *beit din* (Jewish law court) of the Rabbinical Council of California. He is the founding editor of the Cross-Currents blog, on the editorial board of Jewish Action, and a frequent spokesperson for traditional Judaism in national media. He has contributed to several law publications, including Pepperdine Law Review and Pepperdine Dispute Resolution Law Journal.

LEE S. ARIAN (White Collar Crimes): Lee Arian heads the nationwide fraud and abuse department for health insurer, WellPoint. He graduated from UCLA School of Law in 1988 and magna cum laude from Georgetown University in 1985. After graduating from UCLA, Mr. Arian worked for three years for Dewey Ballantine. He then joined the United States Attorney's Office in Los Angeles, where he served in both the civil and criminal divisions and received commendations for his work from the Federal Bureau of Investigation, the United States Secret Service, and the Department of Defense. Mr. Arian left the USAO in 2004 to join WellPoint.

R. LISLE BAKER (Psychology of Conflict): R. Lisle Baker is a professor of law at Suffolk University Law School in Boston, where he teaches courses in property, mediation, and planning for law as a career and an enterprise. He has written on such topics as using insights about perception and judgment from the Myers-Briggs Type Indicator instrument as an aid to mediation, settling land use appeals within the framework of open meeting laws, exploring responses to beneficial but conflicting neighboring uses of land, using special assessments for open space preservation, ethical limits on attorney contact with local zoning officials, recapturing privately conferred windfalls, and taxing land speculation. He is an honors graduate of Williams College and Harvard Law School, where he was a member of the Harvard Legal Aid Bureau. Before joining the Suffolk Law faculty, he practiced with the Boston firm of Hill & Barlow, and argued public policy as a regular participant in the first season of the public television series, *The Advocates*. He has also served for over twenty-five years as an elected alderman in Newton, Massachusetts, including six years as Board President. He has won awards from a local conservation organization for his role in preserving open space, and most recently hosted an award-winning series of televised interviews with local officials and citizens available at www.aldermenatwork.org.

MAKAN DELRAHIM (International Trade): Makan Delrahim is a partner with the Century City office of Brownstein Hyatt Farber Schreck, LLP, and a member of the Litigation and Government Relations departments. Delrahim's practice focuses on international trade policy and antitrust law, particularly as they relate to intellectual property. His current and past clients include high technology firms Qualcomm, Google, Microsoft, Apple, the Recording Industry Association of America and the Ultimate Fighting Championship. He is a frequent commentator and author on competition and intellectual property issues. Mr. Delrahim is the former Deputy Assistant Attorney General for International and Appellate at the US DOJ's Antitrust Division. In addition, he served as Chairman of the Merger Working Group of the International Competition Network (ICN), an organization of antitrust authorities whose goal is to advance international coordination and cooperation of competition law enforcement. Prior to his service at the U.S. Department of Justice, Mr. Delrahim served as staff director and chief counsel of the U. S. Senate Judiciary Committee, under then-Chairman Orrin G. Hatch (R-UT). Mr. Delrahim has also served at the Office of the United States Trade Representative, working on intellectual property matters, and at the National Institutes of Health's Office of Technology Transfers.

ANTHONY A. DIMONTE (Honors Negotiation and Advocacy): Anthony DiMonte is a practicing attorney licensed in both Illinois and California. Mr. DiMonte began his legal career in his hometown of Chicago, Illinois, handling commercial litigation matters in the largest integrated court system in the world, The Circuit Court of Cook County, Illinois. In 1999, Anthony moved his practice to the Los Angeles area where he is now a partner with the firm of Roth & DiMonte, based in South Pasadena, California. Mr. DiMonte is an experienced civil trial lawyer who also handles a wide range of business-transactional matters for domestic and international corporate clients and private entrepreneurs. Anthony received his Bachelor of Arts degree from the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign and his law degree from Chicago-Kent College of Law.

AMY JANE LONGO (Electronic Discovery Practice): Amy Jane Longo is a litigation partner with O'Melveny & Myers, LLP in Los Angeles, and a co-founder and leader of its Electronic Discovery Practice. She graduated as a Harlan Fiske Stone Scholar from Columbia University School of Law in 1996. She is a Council Member of the American Bar Association Section of Litigation, and has served as Co-Chair of its Class Actions and Derivative Suits Committee and a member of its Task Force on Electronic Discovery. She co-authors a practice guide titled Electronic Discovery Practice Under the Federal Rules (BNA 3d ed. 2010), and is an editorial board member of BNA's Digital Evidence and E-Evidence Report and an advisory board member of the Thomson Reuters Electronic Discovery and Document Retention Conference. She has been recognized in The Legal 500 United States for Securities Litigation, and as a Southern California Super Lawyers Rising Star.

CONSTITUTIONAL LAW SEMINAR: ORIGINS OF THE FEDERAL CONSTITUTION: Origins of the Federal Constitution presents an intensive introduction to the historical sources of the Constitution. By reference to original source documents, the class considers the common law and other influences on early American government and justice, including Blackstone's Commentaries; the colonial experience leading to and immediately following the American Revolution; documents and debate directly relevant to formation of individual constitutional provisions and amendments; and the initial experience and understanding of the Constitution, through to Story's Commentaries, in addition to later amendments. The class will also consider the influence and use of this material on modern interpretation of the Constitution.

ELECTRONIC DISCOVERY PRACTICE: In recent years, there has been explosive growth in court decisions and rulemaking regarding discovery of electronically stored information. Much of the caselaw pertains to the propriety of sanctions for the failure to preserve or produce information in discovery -- motions for which have increased dramatically. This class provides an overview of the major concepts in this relatively new discipline, which is grounded in civil procedure and borrows from established doctrines in the areas of preservation, ethics, and spoliation. In addition, the class considers the role of evolving technologies associated with creating, modifying and retaining electronic information, and how these tools intersect with clients' discovery obligations and evidentiary presentations.

FIRST AMENDMENT LAW: The First Amendment to the United States Constitution contains four clauses that embody some of the most fundamental human rights guarantees in our constitutional democracy: the free speech and press clauses guaranteeing freedom of expression, and the establishment and free exercise clauses guaranteeing the freedom of religion. This course will undertake an examination of the historical purposes underlying these clauses, as well as the subsequent development of free expression law and religious freedom law by the U.S. Supreme Court. The aim of this course will be to provide students with an in-depth understanding of these bodies of law, and to examine whether the Court's subsequent interpretation of these constitutional provisions is sound in light of their original purposes. Much attention will be given to the Court's application of these clauses in the context of modern societal conditions and challenges.

TOLERANCE MULTICULTURALISM AND THE LAW: In an age of ever-growing religious and cultural diversity, the modern-nation state is confronting a host of complex questions regarding national identity, individual conscience, and group politics. This course focuses on the two core concepts and the center of such debates: tolerance and multiculturalism. In so doing, the course explores the philosophical, political and legal perspectives that frame contemporary issues at the nexus of individual, community and state. In turn, the course will examine the extent to which these concepts play a role in shaping U.S. law and the extent to which the law addresses the needs of and accommodates the practices of various minority groups.
