NOTICE: PRIORITY ENROLLMENT FOR STRAUS DISPUTE RESOLUTION ELECTIVES

D & L STRAUS DISTINGUISHED VISITING PROFESSOR

PAUL L. CARON (Federal Income Taxation and Federal Estate and Gift Taxation): Paul L. Caron is Associate Dean of Faculty and Charles Hartsock Professor of Law at University of Cincinnati College of Law. He is one of the leading entrepreneurial tax scholars in the country. Since joining the University of Cincinnati faculty in 1990, he has written numerous books and law review articles, and is active in a variety of scholarly projects. Dean Caron's most recent books include *Tax Stories* (Foundation Press, 2d ed. 2009) and *Federal Wealth Transfer Taxation: Cases and Materials* (Foundation Press, 6th ed. 2009) (with Paul McDaniel & Jim Repetti). His most recent law review articles concern the estate tax, law school rankings and the impact of new technologies on legal scholarship and teaching. He serves as Series Editor for Foundation Press in developing a Law Stories Series of books patterned after his *Tax Stories* book. In addition, he is the Publisher and Editor of Tax Prof Blog, the most popular tax blog on the Internet. He is the Publisher and Editor-in-Chief of the Law Professor Blogs Network of more than 50 blogs edited by law professors around the country in other areas of law. Dean Caron has served as a visiting professor at the University of Florida College of Law, Florida State University College of Law, University of San Diego School of Law, and New York University/IRS Office of Chief Counsel Continuing Professional Education Program.

LAURIE L. LEVENSON (Criminal Law): Laurie L. Levenson is a professor of law, William M. Rains fellow and the director of Loyola's Center for Ethical Advocacy. Her recent scholarship includes *California Criminal Law*, the *Federal Criminal Rules Handbook* and *California Criminal Procedure*. She also published several articles in the *National Law Journal* and the *Los Angeles Daily Journal*. Levenson is active in the legal community. She serves as attorney representative to the United States Court of Appeals for the Ninth Circuit and to the US District Court for the Central District of California and is a member of the LA County Bar Association's Judiciary and Judicial Appointments Committee and Bet Tzedek. She is a member of the Board of UCLA's Hillel Council and special master for the LA County Superior Court and the US District Court.

At Loyola, Levenson teaches Criminal Law, Criminal Procedure, White Collar Crime, Ethical Lawyering, Evidence and Advanced Trial Advocacy. Levenson has an AB from Stanford University and a JD from the University of California Los Angeles. While in law school, Levenson was chief articles editor of the *UCLA Law Review*. After graduation, she served as law clerk to the Honorable James Hunter III of the United States Court of Appeals for the Third Circuit. In 1981, she was appointed assistant United States Attorney, Criminal Section, in Los Angeles, where she was a trial and appellate lawyer for eight years and attained the position of senior trial attorney and assistant division chief. Levenson joined the Loyola faculty in 1989 and served as Loyola's associate dean for academic affairs from 1996-99. Before coming to Loyola, she was a member of the adjunct faculty of Southwestern University Law School.

DISTINGUISHED VISITING PRACTITIONER IN RESIDENCE

ROGER COSSACK (Media and the Law): Roger Cossack was a prosecutor and a defense lawyer during his 22 years of practice and in 1984 he argued *U.S. v. Leon* before the U.S. Supreme Court. Prior to beginning his private practice of law he served on the faculty of the UCLA Law School. In 1994 he joined CNN as the co-host of their award winning legal show *Burden of Proof* and also was the CNN legal analyst. From 1994 to 2001 he covered all of the major U.S. legal events including breaking the *Bush v. Gore* decision, the impeachment of President Clinton, and the disputed election of 2000. Since 2002 he has served as the legal analyst for ESPN, reporting on how the law applies in various ways to sports.

NEW ADJUNCT FACULTY MEMBER

TRACYLEE CLARKE (Communication and Conflict): Dr. Tracylee Clarke joins the Straus Institute for Dispute Resolution as an adjunct faculty member. Her current research and teaching interests focus the role of dialogue in conflict prevention and resolution. Dr. Clarke is also an environmental mediator and policy analyst. She has over 16 years experience in environmental conflict management and collaborative policy development and has managed and directed large, complex stakeholder processes and mediations for federal, state, local and tribal governments as well as private industry. Controversial issues she has mediated include natural resource management, land use, endangered species protection, water supply and water quality, transportation, energy development and toxic remediation and clean up. As an environmental consultant she has also designed and conducted professional training workshops for governmental officials and environmental managers to enhance collaborative problem solving, negotiation skills and communication competency. Dr. Clarke is also a faculty member in the Communication program at CSU Channel Islands and is a member of US Institute for Environmental Conflict Resolution, Morris K. Udall Foundation.

CRAIG BOYD GARNER (Hospital Law): Professor Garner is an attorney and health care consultant, specializing in issues surrounding modern American health care and the ways in which it should be managed in its current climate of reform. Between 2002 and 2011, he was the CEO at a community hospital in Los Angeles County, California. Last fall, Professor Garner published his book called *Hospital Stay*, a guide for patients and family members who find themselves in the confusing confines of a hospital environment. Professor Garner also writes specialized articles for various health care publications.

WILL NIX (Selected Issues in Dispute Resolution: Entertainment Industry Disputes): William Nix is an attorney with extensive experience in corporate formation, operations and business affairs, as well as an experienced litigator and ADR practitioner. He has substantial expertise in the entertainment, media, sports, intellectual property fields. In private practice, he served as Co-Chair of the Baker Botts, LLP Entertainment, Media and Sports Law Practice Group. He represented producers, broadcasting, sports league/team, Internet software production and delivery companies. He handled their corporate, licensing, merchandising, sponsorship, franchising, and other intellectual property matters, including litigation in the federal courts, AAA Arbitrations and administrative proceedings with federal and international government agencies, including the Copyright Office of the Library of Congress and the United States Patent and Trademark Office. He was Vice President of Legal and Business Affairs for NBA Properties, Inc., where he had worldwide legal and business responsibilities for commercial development and marketing including the sponsorship and consumer product areas of licensed merchandise, publishing, trading cards, and new media such as CD-ROM/interactive games, edumedia, and online programming and other services. Before joining NBA Properties, he was with the Motion Picture Association of America for sixteen years. In his most recent position, he served as Senior Vice-President and the Chief Operating Officer of its Worldwide Anti-Piracy Division. The MPAA guards the copyrights and trademarks against counterfeiting, illegal duplication, online, and signal theft in all media, for the major motion picture and television studios.

His educational background includes the UCLA School of Entertainment Studies, Graduate Program in Film, Television and Digital Production and Marketing, Entertainment Studies Program; Columbia University School of Law, Parker School of Foreign & Comparative Law Advanced Practice Institute; Harvard/MIT Advanced Negotiation Training Institute; LL.M., Trade Regulation, New York University School of Law; J.D., Hofstra University School of Law; Dean's Distinguished Service Award; Senior Editor, Moot Court Board of Editors; M.A., History/Teaching, Antioch College; and A.B., English and American literature, Georgetown University. He is a lifetime voting-member of the Academy of Motion Picture Arts and Sciences, and served on its Documentary Feature Film Award Nominating Committee for several years as well as on its 2010 Oscar Nomination Screening Committee for Best Foreign Language Film, the International Documentary Association, serving on its 2008 and 2009 Feature Film and 2010

Documentary Short Nominating Juries, the Academy of Television Arts and Sciences, serving as a Judge on its 2009 College Television Awards Panel, the National Academy of Recording Arts and Sciences, and the Academy of Interactive Arts and Sciences.

KEITH WHITNEY (Accounting for Lawyers): L. Keith Whitney (Accounting for Lawyers): L. Keith Whitney was a tax accountant with a major CPA firm and a labor and municipal lawyer during his brief years of law practice in Illinois. His research interests are primarily in the corporate governance and corporate social responsibility areas. In 1981 he returned to academia and has served as Associate Professor of Business Law and Finance at Seaver College for 25 years. He was Division Chair for the maximum term of 7 years, as well as Chair over the Business & Accounting programs at another college from 1981 to 1983. He is was a doctoral student in accounting and finance and holds a Juris Doctorate from Texas Tech University's School of Law (1977).

NEW COURSES BEING OFFERED THIS SPRING 2011

HOSPITAL LAW: Hospitals make up the cornerstone of the American health care system, yet their evolution, codified in four centuries of federal and state law, has resulted from a multitude of diverse factors. Some of the driving forces behind these changes include advances in technology and medical science, an ever-expanding national and global economy, a constantly changing political landscape, and the gradual but persistent progression of basic human, civil, and fundamental rights. This combination of events, 275 years in the making, has ultimately created the hospital system we know today. A careful study of these past legal principles, coupled with a firm grasp of the laws which now govern America's hospitals and health care system (including the 2010 Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act), will prepare the lawyers of tomorrow to help shape the future of health care for decades to come.

JUDICIAL CLERKSHIP WRITING WORKSHOP: This will be an intensive working seminar focused on preparing students for federal judicial clerkships. The writing assignments will include bench memoranda, drafting opinions, analyzing circuit splits, and editing drafts. The seminar will meet as arranged by appointment and will be graded on a pass/fail basis. Enrollment by permission of professor only and is limited to those students who have secured clerkships with judges.

WATER RESOURCES LAW: This course will acquaint students with foundational water rights jurisprudence, while emphasizing western water resources law. Topics may include: differences between the prior appropriation system in the Western United States and Eastern riparian rights law; public vs. private rights; acquisition, transfer, and loss of private rights to use surface and underground waters; public rights in water for navigation, recreation and environmental protection; water institutions such as suppliers of municipal water and irrigation water; federal vs. state control; Native American water rights; inter-state water allocations with a particular focus on California; and water supply disputes between the United States, Mexico, and Canada.
