ADVANCE ASSIGNMENTS FOR INTENSIVE COURSES

A class syllabus including any advance reading and/or writing assignments for intensive classes will be emailed to students 3-4 weeks prior to the start of class. Please note that it is each student's responsibility to review the syllabus well before the class begins and complete any advance assignments. Students who show up the first day unprepared risk being dropped from the class.

RESCHEDULING EXAMS

While most Straus classes will require a final paper instead of a final exam, it is important for everyone to be aware of the exam rescheduling policy in the event you enroll in one or more classes with a final exam. Students may not petition to reschedule a final exam unless two final exams are to be taken on the same day. Therefore, it is important for you to pay attention to the final exam schedule when you are selecting your courses. Petitions to change one of two exams scheduled for the same day must be filed by the seventh week of classes. NEW ADJUNCT FACULTY MEMBERS

Maria Chedid is a partner at Baker & McKenzie, where she chairs the firm's international arbitration practice on the U.S. West Coast. She has been an international arbitration practitioner for more than 20 years, acting as counsel in arbitrations before a variety of arbitral institutions, including the ICC, LCIA, ICDR, AAA, JAMS, ICSID, IUSCT, and UNCC. Her arbitrations have involved disputes relating to licensing, IP, energy, infrastructure, political risk insurance, construction, breach of government contracts, joint ventures, and taxation, and parties from Asia, Europe, the Middle East, Africa and Latin America. She has also represented clients in U.S. courts in cases involving a variety of multijurisdictional and cross-border litigation issues. In 2014, Ms. Chedid was named one of California's Top 100 Women Lawyers. Recognized as a leading lawyer in the field of international arbitration by Chambers and other publications, she is described as "superbly prepared and relentless" and is praised for her "highly effective advocacy," the "quality of her written and oral presentation," and her "capabilities in intellectual property disputes." Ms. Chedid currently serves as president of the Northern California International Arbitration Club, and is a frequent speaker, author, and guest lecturer on international arbitration. She obtained her B.A. in Philosophy with distinction from Barnard College and her J.D. from New York University School of Law, where she also completed a one-year fellowship in public international law.

Sarah Park is a graduate of UC Berkeley (summa cum laude) and Harvard Law School. She has practiced in the areas of business and intellectual property litigation in California, and in trademark and software licensing in Korea at the international law firm of Kim & Chang. She currently teaches legal research and writing. She has also read for a certificate in Divinity at the University of Cambridge in church history, has served as Director of Publishing for The Veritas Forum (an imprint of IV Press), and has led Bible studies on college campuses in the U.S. and Korea.

Selina Shultz is a mediator and consultant in dispute resolution, who works with individuals and businesses. She has over 17 years of extensive mediation experience. Shultz currently serves as the codirector of CoralBridge Partner's Conflict Transformation Institute. In addition to her private mediation practice, she served for 13 years as a mediator for the Allegheny County Court of Common Pleas. She is currently on the approved mediator panels for the U.S. District Court for the Western District of Pennsylvania, the EEOC, and the U.S. Bankruptcy Court. She is a popular lecturer and trainer in the area of dispute resolution and has worked with individuals and businesses to provide both basic and advanced trainings in mediation and conflict resolution skills. She is an adjunct professor at Duquesne University Law School, where she co-teaches the first law school credit course on attorney judgment and decision making. She has served as a leader in the field, most recently serving on the boards of both the Pennsylvania Council of Mediators and the Mediation Council of Western Pennsylvania, and helping to launch the Western District of Pennsylvania's Prisoners Civil Rights Mediation Pilot Program. She obtained her JD in 1993 from the University of Pittsburgh and her LLM in dispute resolution from the Straus Institute at Pepperdine University School of Law.

Donald Wolfe is partner in a boutique San Diego based law firm focused on negotiation, mediation and litigation support. Mr. Wolfe is often retained by business executives, entrepreneurs and other attorneys in order to negotiate the essential deal points in business transactions or to revive broken or stalled negotiations. Mr. Wolfe has negotiated business transactions and settlement agreements in both domestic and international matters. Mr. Wolfe is the creator of the Walk Softly and Carry a Big Stick - Negotiation Lessons for Lawyers program which is a State Bar of California CLE approved presentation created to provide negotiation training for lawyers. Mr. Wolfe has most recently completed a sabbatical whereby he studied in depth the negotiation and mediation strategies utilized to ink the 1905 Treaty of Portsmouth, which ended the Russo-Japanese War. In the course of his research he traveled to Portsmouth, New Hampshire, Washington, D.C. and Tokyo, Japan in order to study original documentation. Mr. Wolfe has been a member of the California State and Federal Bar since 2001.

Michael D. Young follows the guiding wisdom of an ancient philosopher (who is somehow *still* touring the country with his mates despite being seemingly 235 years old): *"You can't always get what you want. But if you try real hard, you just might find, you get what you neeeeeeed."* A mediator since 1989, Professor Young helps warring parties find peace by helping them get what they neeeeeeed. Professor Young is currently a full time mediator with Judicate West and past President of the International Academy of Mediators. He taught Mediation and Negotiation for nearly a decade at USC Law School, and brings to this course, and his mediations, over 30 years of litigation and mediation experience, particularly in the areas of intellectual property, employment, and commercial disputes. Professor Young has served as a member of the California State Bar's Standing Committee on ADR for five years, and remains very active in the dispute resolution community, speaking publicly, and publishing on the use of ADR in the resolution of complex disputes.
